Administrator's Report 09/11/23

The Webb City Parks Department is planning a Holiday Lighting Ceremony to be held the evening of November 25th. This will also coincide with the Webb City Employees VIP night at the Polar Bear Express. The Mayor and hopefully all members of the council will be present to light the park up that night. The event should start at 5:30pm. There will be more information as we move closer to the date.

Waste Water personnel are continuing with the rebuild of the Walnut Ridge Lift Station. They are adding another holding tank to help with flow issues and more protection from the (NON) disposable wipes that have plagued that area.

We are still waiting for the mobilization of the contractor to begin the manhole rehab project. We hope to seal up 17 manholes and 3 lift stations which should really make an improvement in our inflow and infiltration numbers. This project was recently approved by council and should begin as soon as the vendor can supply the required materials.



Fall Soccer begins this coming Tuesday, our public works and parks personnel are putting the finishing touches on the new large gravel parking lot, adjacent to the soccer complex, that we feel will make a real improvement on the recent parking issues we have experienced in the park. Especially with flag football kicking off also next week.

Drilling is complete on the new well and testing is still underway but as of today it looks like we will be able to install a 125 HP motor and hope to have an available constant 300-350 additional gallons per minute from the new water well. Once the initial pump and well are complete Public Works will begin the installation of the concrete building and required equipment similar to what was completed last year on North Hawthorne with that well. We will see significant cost savings as we utilize our own personnel who now have experience in such installation and construction. We are estimating once the current \$300,000 drilling and testing is completed we will see approximately another \$500,000 in expenses to bring the well online.

Estimates are in for the 2nd round of paving for this summer utilizing remaining American Rescue Plan funding. The list of streets within this project are attached to the council report to be presented to council at this meeting. The total estimate for all is \$449,177.34. It appears that the first round of paving recently completed did come in well under budget saving an approximately \$50,000 from the estimated nearly \$600,000 planned.

Our downtown retail merchants & business owners have asked to host an afternoon trick-or-treat event from 1-4 p.m. on Tuesday, October 31. Since that day is always a scheduled half day for area schools, this will give parents & care-givers an early safe place to trick-or-treat with their children.

Previous Meetings

Striping of the Farmers Market was completed we are awaiting a shipment of more yellow paint and maybe some cooler weather to begin the **striping project on the newly paved sections of East Street and Fountain Road.**

Department Heads will be working on preparing their 23/24 Fiscal Budgets in the next few weeks.

The **Shades on the Amphitheater seating are now complete**. Park staff have the ability to put the shades up now and the contractor has been given the go ahead to repair and re-stain the amphitheater building itself. **There is some wood repairs and roof leaks that need fixed in addition to a complete re-stain. All work will be within the original budget for the shades as a late fee of not having the shades ready by the festival.**

The tarps used around the pavilion during the winter are getting old and showing some wear. We have had them repaired a couple times recently but are exploring the idea of replacing them before the Polar Bear Express dates this year. The Farmers Market has agreed to contribute 50% to the cost of the project.

The **lights are up and running on the Pre K and Kindergarten soccer field**. Several coaches are using the lights to get in practice as we all try to get through this heat spell. The lights have proved to be very handy.

The Fire Department and public works have teamed up together to replace the bridge over to the Frisco Trail located behind the Fire Department. Public Works is lending a hand with some of the structure needs and our Fire Department crews are working on the hand work to rebuild the walking bridge.

The Parks Department has been busy as they transition from summer baseball and softball programs to the fall programs. These programs consist of Soccer, Cheer, and Flag Football. One new item we hope to use this fall is the new lighted soccer fields located where the rodeo arena once was. All preparations are complete and we hope to see pre-K and Kindergarten teams using this new field this fall. Now that the soccer field is complete we will be focusing some attention on the old fenced in area and possibly converting that into a dog park.

The date for the **Paint the Town Red Parade and Bonfire has been set**. Please mark your calendars for the evening Wednesday September 20th so you do not miss this great event to be held here in downtown and then the Bonfire out on the School Property on North Pennsylvania.

Staff have been working with EPA and Cardinal Valley Habitat Trustees to fund a large concrete pad to be utilized in our bio-solid composting program. Currently we use the gravel area north of the plant to lay out our rows for composting and drying. A concrete pad would reduce wear and tear on our equipment and reduce any water seepage that occurs during the process. We have received word that this project has been approved for funding and we should be contacted in the near future with further details. This will be something we have been working on for many years and are excited to see it become even a possibility.

Parks Department has plans to move the small Caboose located next to the Splash Pad and bring it into the shop for some extensive repairs. The Caboose has been the victim of some serious vandalism over the last several months and it will be much easier to repair in the shop. We plan once the repairs are completed to relocate the Caboose to the area between the Farmers Market and the Depot in the grassy area where the buggy once was. We hope this will give it some better protection and lighting.

New summer hours have been started at the recycle gate location. They are now open the following hours for the summer months. 11am – 6pm Monday thru Friday and 9am-2pm on Saturday and Sunday. The recycling collections have also increased and we are working with our waste hauler to try and get additional roll offs or increased removals.

Grant Acceptance MoDOT Highway Safety Traffic Grant Awards September 11, 2023

SUBJECT:

The Police Department is seeking the Council's approval to accept \$63,896 in grant funding from the Missouri Department of Transportation and purchase equipment using the City's procurement process.

BACKGROUND:

The Missouri Department of Transportation will fully fund saturation patrols (driving while intoxicated wolf packs) and hazardous moving violation enforcement patrols from October 1, 2023 through September 30, 2024. Funding awarded for saturation patrols is \$40,196 and \$23,700 for hazardous moving violation enforcement patrols. Funding included in these grants will go toward the purchase of four in-car camera systems (\$19,196) and four dual antenna radar systems (\$6,700). The City of Webb City is not required to provide any matching funds to claim this award.

RECOMMENDATION:

Allow the Webb City Police Department to accept grant funding from the Missouri Department of Transportation.

Allow the Webb City Police Department to purchase equipment awarded in this grant using the City's procurement process.

FISCAL IMPACT:

The police department will budget \$63,896 in their 2023-24 fiscal year budget as revenue funds for these grant awards.

We have received the estimate for the second round of planned overlay paving to be completed in mid to late September.

Blevins Asphalt has submitted the total estimate for the attached list and locations to be paved and the estimate is \$449,177.34
